Introduction

1. With the approval of HQ 28 COMWEL Inf Bde the Malay Village known as Kampong Pantai Tanah Merah, approx 6¹/₂ miles from Camp Terendak is to be adopted by 4 RAR as part of 17 Div/Malaya District Hearts and Minds Operations.

2. A description of Kampong Pantai Tanah Merah, including its people and their occupations, as propared by the Rev. Marcus Scott-Ross of St Andrews Club, is attached. (The Rev Scott-Ross occupies a bring at the village).

3. The code name of the 4 RAR operation is to be GOTONG ROYONG (Hutual Assistance) and its security is UNCLASSIFIED.

Aim and Scope

- 4. The aim of Op GOTONG ROYONG is:
 - a. to assist the people of Kampung Pantai Tanah Merah in attaining a higher level of sufficiency and well being, and in particular the youth, the agod and the less fortunate.
 - b. to foster goodwill between Australians and Malaysians.

5. The scope is to cover assistance in as many fields as possible within the kampong, the projects preferably being self generating. The whole concept is that the ideas come from the people, the technical assistance and supervision/ advice from us and the implementation of the project jointly by Australian and Malaysians. However, where labour forces are required the local people should be encouraged to give maximum participation, an example of how a project could be shared, if possible, is subtended:

- a. Help from 4 RAR
 - (1) Provision of materials.
 - (2) Expert knowledge.
 - (3) Supervision.
 - (4) Loan of equipment.
- b. Provided by people
 - (1) Local materials.
 - (2) Labour.

Background

6. CO 4 RAR visited Kampong Pantai Tanah Merah as the guest of the Rev. Scott-Ross on several occasions during Nov/Dec 1966; from these visits evolved the plan to adopt this kampong as part of Civic Mission activities by 4 RAR.

7. Appointments were made separately with the District Officer Malacca, Inche Mohd Saufi and the Chief Minister, Inche Abdul Ghafar bin Baba and approval in principle was obtained to proceed with the operation. The DO also .../2 proposed that 4 RAR be represented on his Rural Development Committee which meets regularly in Malacca to plan, review and co-ordinate all rural community welfare schemes.

8. The Governor of Malacea, Tun Haji Abdul Malex was advised of the above by CO 4 RLR and indicated his approval of the proposal.

9. HQ MAF were briefed by CO 4 RAR on the outline plan. In response to D Cond AAF request for a financial breakdown of the approx \$4000M allocated to 4 RAR for "Hearts and Minds" activities for 1966/67, it was accepted by D Cond that following Exercises FAST MOVE II and JUNGLE JANUS, Bulan Puasa and 4 RAR birthday celebrations, that a plan would be produced which would incorporate a forecast costing for Op GOTONG ROYONG.

Preliminary Moves

10. These are considered to be in sequence:

- a. DO and CO discuss plan on a joint basis of co-operation.
- b. Visit/recce/briefing at Kanpong Pantai Tanah Merah by CO and DO.
- c. Recce by specialist AUST gps.
- d. Programme begins.

Further elaboration of preliminary moves are described in paras 11-14 subtended.

11. CO 4 RAR is to arrange interview with DO in MALACCA and to outline programme of proposed activities and preliminary moves. Following general agreement on the plan including the form of linison between 4 RAR Civic Mission and the Rural Development Committee, arrangements are to be agreed on the initial joint visit (DO and CO) to the kampong to speak to the elders and the people.

12. The initial visit to Kampong Pantai Tanah Merah should be propared to conduct preliminary talks with the dewan kanpong and in particular to obtain the support of the Inen. Subsequently the people of the kanpong should be addressed, firstly by the DO and then by the CO 4 RAR, and the plan explained.

13. Subsequently, recee parties should visit the kampong, desirably with a Malaysian interpretor or official of the DOs department so as to assess the specialist task and then prepare the specialist plan, bearing in mind the requirements for materials, timings, local labour, costs, supervision etc. The specialist plans are to be cleared by the 4 RAR Civic Mission Committee who will ensure that the Malacca Rural Devolpment Committee are kept informed.

14. On approval of each specialist plan the programme will begin and periodic reports of progress will be submitted to the Civic Mission Committee.

Procedures

15. The 4 RAR Civic Mission Committee, following approval of the specialist plan will be responsible to:-

- a. allocate troops to the task.
- b. approve outline timetable.
- c. approve proposed financial and material aid to be allocated.
- d. ensure liaison between the task, the Connitte and the Rural Development Committee at Malacca.

16. The 4 RAR Civic Mission Committee will consist of the following permanent members:

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2IC -(Chairman) Capt HELRN -(Exce Offr) IO -(Secretary) OC fisht Phr Pl OC Sig Pl RMO OC 32 Dental Unit WOIL O'KWEFE

The Chairman will have the authority to co opt additional members as necessary, including for example, the Salvation Amy representative, SSAF1, Wives Club, Education Corps, Chapkins, Sports representatives and affiliated Engineers.

Tasks/Projects

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17. The report at Annex 'A' gives indication of fields wherein help may be extended. Subject to detailed rece and examination, offorts in the following fields would appear to be acceptable:-

- a. financial aid to procure fishing nets, engines for sampans, bigger craft, buffaloes, poultry, padi grain, etc.
- b. scholarship opportunities for selected youth.
- c. support in providing educational facilities books, desks, forms, black boards etc.
- d. hygione medical care instruction of medical orderlies pre metal instruction - dental treatment.
- e. sports facilities badminton, sepak bola, basketball courtscompetitions.
- f. maint, repair, building of roads, bridges and culverts community cnetres, school etc.
- g. improvement of water supply wells.
- h. clearing of land for padi or other crops.
- j. providing construction kits for self help projects in schools.

Troops to Tasks

- 18. The force available for employment on Op GOTONG ROYONG is as follows: 4 RAR
 - 32 AUST Dental Unit.

Assistance may be obtained through HQ 28 COMWEL Inf Ede for specialist help from Engineers, Medical, RCT, if required. However, within the framework of Commonwealth activities the project for Kampong Pantai Tanah Merah is to be considered as an Australian one, and publicity will be accordingly slanted in that direction.

Tinings

19. It must be borne in mind that Civic Mission tasks must be intervoven with training and other unit activities, and emphasis and activity will perforce slacken or cease during major unit activities such as Ex CARSHLTON (13-23 Mar), and unit ARL from 24 Mar - 17 Apr. With these qualifications, and subject to the availability of the District Officer and his staff, a forecast of GOTONG ROYONG activities is subtended:

Publicity

20. This will be co-ordinated with PR 17 Div/MLLAYA District and AUSTARI. 'Maximum warning of any activity will be given.

Liaison

21. Co-ordination and lisison with the Dewan Rakjat at Kampong Pantai Tanah Morah, the District Officer and the Malacca Rural Development Committee must be maintained and will be close and continuous. The detail of implementation of such liaison and co-ordination will be the subject of agreement between CO 4 RAR and District Officer Malacca.

Discipline

22. Any assistance given by 4 RAR or other units and any goodwill gained would be immediately jeopardized or forfeited by acts of indiscipline towards the people of Kanyong Pantai Tanah Merah by troops engaged on civic mission tasks. Any breach of discipline will be dealt with by ne with the utnest severity, and this will be notified to all ranks. AUST personnel will always be under the command of an officer or NCO and supervision will be maintained at all times. The customs and habits of the people will be respected and troops earmarked for tasks will be briefed accordingly.

Finance

23. On receipt of the specialist plans which, when applicable, will include an estimate of costs, the 4 RAR Civic Mission Committee will tabulate all costs estimated for all projects. These will be forwarded to HQ AUSTARM Singapore by 1 Mar 67.

Conclusion

24. GOTONG ROYONG means "Mutual Assistance". This implies a contract between equal partners. This is the message that must be put across to the people in Kanpong PANTAI TANAH MERAH, that this is the beginning of a friendship and partnership which will spread to the people of Malaysia and Australia.

The distance from Terendak Camp to Kampong Tanah Merah is 5 miles.

1. <u>Population and Housing</u>

Total 300 plus,

One half of the total population (150) ages between 1-16.

Of this figure (150) approx 30 attend school.

There are approx 64 Malay Houses and 4 Chinese. In average of 6-8 live in each house although I know one Chinese house with 15 living in.

2. Local Industries

Of the 64 houses in the Karpong 7 households are actively engaged in fishing. One Chinese family owns the two Kaylongs a mile out to sea. They use one or two sampans with out-board motors.

The remainder have sampans without notors and one recently berrowed a quite large sum of money from a member of my staff in order to have a sampan built.

In-shore fishing is a poor venture in the area. Often the catches are negligible and the monthly family income can be as low as $$50 \ 1$ month.

As far as I can see, (and apart from one Chinese family who own the Kaylongs), fishing is done by Line and not by Net.

I suspect that the reason is one of finance. A net night cost in the region of \$500 and such money is not available. Nor is money available to buy engines for the sampans. A 3 h.p. Johnson engine for instance would cost about \$430.

Of the other 57 Kaupong Houses about 25 are dependent on employment in Terendak as labourers. Their pay scale is somewhere between \$75 and \$100.

Of the remaining 32 houses 10 household owners leave the Kampong and search for employment in places such as Kuala Lumpur in unskilled jobs in order to support their families back home.

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The romainder would be termed small farmers, e.g. padi, poultry, etc. Average family income is around \$100 per month.

The main need is capital to buy bigger boats, ongines, nets, buffaloes,

etc.

3. Education

The standard is low and the school leaving age is 14.

Of the 30 children attending school 25 attend local Malay Schools (where standard is not high - and where no English is taught) and 5 attend English schools in Malacca and Masjid Tanah. The 3 attending school at Masjid Tanah (ages 15-18) board in at school and two are very anxious to join the Armed Services. Their parents and guardians find it very difficult to meet the cost of board, books, bus fares, clothes etc. I have personally assisted then on numerous occasions. One of the 3 boys attending boarding school at Masjid Tanah is the Inan's grandson but he too often is unable to meet the school costs.

Given the opportunity possibly a higher proportion would attend English Schools.

Those boys leaving school at 14 years of age (of whom there are at present approx 50) find work in the following categories:

Army See Fishing Rubber Tapping Casual Labour in Kampong.

They have little prospect of improving their lot but they are not by any means depressed. I have spoken to a good number during the past year and concluded that they are not without ambition but they are reconciled to the fact that unless they are assisted by a benevolent state there is very little chance of their achieving any high goals in life.

4. Health

In my opinion the standard is not high.

There is no doctor near at hand but there is a resident Bonoh to whom the Malcys go in the first instance if they are sick. His fees are not inexpensive and his methods are to say the least questionable. He is treated with great respect by the superstitious Malays. As a last resort the sick are taken to the Malacca Hospital.

Private doctors are rarely, if ever, employed.

On the occasions when I have taken youngsters to a private Chinese doctor, he has told me that the patient was also suffering from diet deficiencies, A project to encourage the Malays to feed their children milk and fruit ete would be of lasting benefit to the people.

5. Conclusion

The Acting Pungulu's name is Mohd. Yassin. He is not a poor nam and his brother who was himself the Pungulu owns a Mercedes Benz. Neither he nor his brother however live in the Kampong.

The Iman lives in the Kampong next to the Mosque. He is well housed but is poor.

<u>4 RAR TRAINING DIRECTIVE 1967 -</u> SUPPLEMENT NO 1

Reference: Our 234-1-2 of Dec 66

Introduction

1. Since I produced the Training Directive in December 1966 the battalion has launched successfully into its programme of training to fit itself for my Aim (para 4 of the reference).

2. Certain new factors have obtruded and circumstances have arisen which necessitates some changes in the Directive. Further modification will undoubtedly be necessary as the year advances.

3. The aim of this supplement is therefore to review and revise certain subjects contained in the reference.

Formation Training

- 4. These are to be subject to some change as follows:
 - a. the Counter Revolutionary Warfare exercise remains the same except for its codename CARSHALTON and is to cover the period 13-23 Mar.
 - b. the Brigade study period (Ex HARD LOOK) is to be deferred until probably Oct 67, after 4 RAR has left the theatre. CRY HAVOC III will probably take place in May 67 instead of HARD LOOK. This will only affect the Commanding Officer.
 - c. a brigade CPX (NERVE CENTRE) may not take place as such, and training in this aspect may be achieved per media of other already planned exercises, e.g. CARSHALTON, BROADSWORD, etc.
 - d. the Ede HQ only will probably be in THAILAND for most of May taking part in a SEATO exercise. There will be no unit representation.
 - e. the exercise set and controlled by HQ 17 Div in Jun 67 is to be renamed, and rescheduled from 20 30 Jun.

Unit Training

5. Sub unit training will continue through Feb, early Mar (prior to Ex CARSHALTON) and the latter half of Apr (fol return from ARL). Company level training including company exercises set and controlled at bn level, will take place during May and Jun (prior to the div ex). During this period I want company commanders at least once to work by night and sleep by day for a period of not less than four days/nights. This can only be practised when in the field on company training.

6. CPX scheduled for Feb (para 12 of the ref) will be trimmed and limited to currently planned Sig Ex and Voice Procedure training and culminating in a general discussion period on CP procedures prior to Ex CARSHALTON. The CPX proposed for May will be implemented in conjunction with the coy ex controlled by bn.

.../2

7. The question of deep jungle operations adjacent to the THALAYSIAN border is still awaiting Government decision, and is subject to decisions regarding timings for the Malaysian relief by 8 RAR. Our planning and preparations must be flexible enough to allow for this possibility immediately prior to our final concentration in Terendak prior to RTA.

Leave

8. The majority of the unit will be absent on ARL from 24 Mar - 17 Apr. I want sub unit commanders to plan carefully their programmes so that the troops under their command can be brought back to the required level of physical fitness and operational efficiency as soon as possible following their return from leave. Rear Details will continue with the maximum training effort consistont with the performance of essential duties in Terendak Camp during this period.

Conclusion

9. The battalion is starting to shape up - it is NOT yet ready. It is our responsibility to be operationally fit whenever the call comes. See to it that this is achieved as quickly as possible.

SECTION XII - ORDERLY DUTIES PART 1 - ORDERS FOR BATTALION ORDERLY OFFICER

The Battalion Orderly Officer is to mount duty for a period of 24 hours 311. at 0900hrs weekdays and 0800hrs weekends. The dismounting Orderly Officer is to dismount at O800hrs weekdays through the Adjt. On weekends he is to dismount when relieved.

 - b. Unless otherwise notified he is to inspect the Battalion Quarter Guard at 0930hrs, Mon, Ved and Fri.
 - c. He is to report back to the Duty Room at 1200hrs. At 1330hrs he is to contact the Adjutant for any special instructions. If there are none, he is to return to training.
 - d. At 1500hrs he is to remount duty.
 - e. Hygiene. A hygiene inspection of the kitchens, messes, latrines and the NAAFI Barber Shop and kitchen is to be carried out daily at 1500hrs. In the Orderly Officer's absence he is to detail the Duty Sgt before hand to inspect the hygiene. Any remedial action required that cannot be effected immediately is to be reported in the Orderly Officer's Report.
 - f. <u>Meal Inspection</u>. He is to be present at, and inspect, at least two meals in the ORs' Mess. Any instances of food shortages or deficiency in food quality are to be reported to the Regimental Messing Officer.
 - Prisoners. He is to inspect any prisoners in the guard room once g. daily and ensure that they are visited daily by the FMO or his representative.
 - Regimental Quarter Guard. He is to call out the Cuard at least once h. after 1900hrs and sign the guard report to that effect.
 - The duty vehicles are controlled by the Orderly Duty Vehicles. j. Officer and are not to be used without his permission. One of the two vehicles will be a Stand-By vehicle kept in the Battalion Tpt Compound. This vehicle is to be used in emergencies at the Orderly Officer's discretion. Admin Coy Orderly Room Cpl will have the name and location of the stand-by driver who can be called upon.
 - k. He is to report any incidents of major immediate importance to the Adjt (20 Lincoln Circle, Phone 474) or in his absence the CO (4 Hull Ave, Phone 475).
 - 1. He is to report details of the following incidents to Staff Duty Officer, HQ 28 COMVEL Inf Bde by telephone: .../76
- (1) Fires.
- (2) Incidents involving arrest of members of 4 RAR by the Civil Police.
- (3) Incidents, including traffic accidents, involving members of 4 RAR and Asian civilians.
- (4) Cases of subversive or suspected subversive activity by Asian civilians.
- (5) The despatch of any NOTICAS advice or AUST URGENT REPORT and the details of these advices/reports.
- m. He is to record all events of an unusual nature in the Orderly Officers Report Book but is NOT to include normal duties performed.
- n. He is NOT to exchange duties, nor leave the Battalion Area without prior approval of the Adjt.
- o. All signal messages, received after hours, with a precedence of PRIORITY or above are to be seen and initialled by the Orderly Officer. Action taken is to be recorded in the Report Book. Mossages are to be handled on their merits and referrred to Bn Staff Officers if necessary. Mossages with a precedence below PRIORITY are to be passed to the Chief Clerk on the next working day.

- b. Members married in this Theatre and Members with no Furniture or Effects in Storage in Australia
 - (1) Application for Removal at Departmental Expense (AAF H10) - 2 copies.
 - (2) Inventory of Effects for Removal to Australia - 2 copies.
- c. Rehousing for Departmental Reasons within this Theatre
 - (1) Application for Removal at Departmental Expense (AAF H10) - 2 copies.
 - (2) Inventory of Effects for Removal 2 copies.

(AAF RO 41/67).

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FINANCIAL CONDITIONS ON RETURN TO AUSTRALIA

1. MFR 105A which granted certain financial concessions to members returning to Australia with their families, has been repealed. Notwithstanding this, the Military Board has ruled that the provisions of the regulation can be deemed to remain in force in their entirety.

2. In brief, MFR 105A applies to married accompanied members who RTA to an area where married quarters are not available and a housing shortage exists. (This should be certified by the Command to which the member is posted, before RTA). These members are permitted to move their families and effects at public expense to a place where suitable accommodation exists. Further, when accommodation in the area of employment is obtained, these members are entitled to free removal of their families and effects to that accommodation, provided they still have six months to serve there.

3. The concession is to be drawn to the attention of all married accompanied members prior to their return to Australia.

4. For ease of reference, the full text of the repealed MFR 105A is subtended;

"105A.

 In this regulation "oversea country" means a country determined by the Military Board to be an oversea country for the purposes of this regulation. (2) Where -

- (a) Upon the termination of a member's service in an oversea country as a member of, or attached to, a body unit or detachment of the Military Forces of the Commonwealth or of another part of the Queen's dominions, the member and his family return to Australia from the country; and
- (b) In the opinion of the Commander of a Command -
 - (i) a housing shortage exists in the locality in which the member is, by virtue of his posting, required to serve in Australia upon his return from the overseas country; and
 - (ii) suitable accommodation for the family of the member is not available in that locality.
- (3) Where, the balance of the intended period of service in a locality of a member whose family was transported to a place at the cost of the Department under the last preceding subregulation is not less than six months at the time when he obtain accommodation for his family in that locality, the cost of transporting his family and their personal effects to that locality from the place is payable by the department."

(AAFRO 42/67).

IMPORTATION OF ARMS TO AUSTRALIA

90.

1. The Department of Customs and Excise has reported that a considerable number of servicemen have brought or sent prohibited weapons from operational areas into Australia.

2. Although members have made no attempt to conceal the firearms at the time of importation, the Department of Customs has been obliged to seize the weapons which are restricted imports in terms of the Customs (Prohibited Imports) Regulations. Importations of weapons is not permitted unless intending impoters produce the written authority of Police Authorities to have possession of such weapons. In cases so far Police Authorities have refused to issue permits under State Legislation to allow members to retain firearms in their possession, and the Customs Department has had no option but to retain such weapons.

3. The practice of members returning to Australia with firearns, whether rifles or pistols, or any other dangerous weapon is to cease. Members are not to forward any firearns or other weapons to Austr lia by mail.

4. Conditions governing the importation of firearms (ie the requirement to declare all firearms and their release being subject to Police approval) are mentioned on pages 4 and 5 of the pamphlet "Guide to Customs" which has been forwarded to sub units.

5. To prevent a recurrence of members returning to Australia with weapons, sub units are to ensure that all ranks are periodically reminded that:

- a. The importation of firearms is covered by specific civil regulations and military instructions;
- b. Failure to observe the relevant regulations will result in the seizure of the wpn etc and may result in legal action.

•5•

3. Members accompanied by dependents who are travelling at public expense will be accommod ted in hotels. Sub units are to advise HQ 4 RAR of the requirements at least 48 hours before movement occurs.

(ALF RO 52/67)

96. CONDUCT IN DEALING WITH CONTRACTORS

1. Officers, other ranks and civilian employees must guard against being placed in such a position as may lay then open to the suspicion of being influenced in the performance of their duties as a result of the acceptance of hospitality or of gifts.

2. They must be gorapilcusly careful in their relationships and have no personal dealings with army contractors, their agents or employees. It is important that they realise the possibility of bribery particularly as the extent of contractors interests is not always apparent.

3. It is essential that no officer, soldier or civilian employee should allow himself to become implicated through failure to understand the regulations or to appreciate the dangers which exist.

(AAF RO 44/67)

97. CORRESPONDENCE

Copy of HQ AAF RO 18/67 is reproduced below:

"1. The standard of correspondence being received at this headquarters from some units leaves much to be desired. Examples are:

- a. Letters are often unreferenced and undated.
- b. Note paper, in some cases signed by a Cpl or Pte, has been used as the covering memo.
- c. No covering letter has accompanied routine
 - applications, such as HDA, Application for Special Overseas Living Allowance and Application to Take Leave Abroad.
- <u>NOTE</u>: covering letters are not necessary if the form is self-explanatory and indicates clearly unit/ date/file number; forms should be typed.
- d. Insufficient copies of correspondence being received.

2. Official correspondence from units is being sent to this headquarters over the signature of relatively junior officers, and in some cases NCOs. In some cases it is not known whether these letters etc have the authority of the Unit Commander.

3. Attention is drawn to paragraph 280, ARO 45/65. Letters are to be signed by, or for, the Unit Commander. If circumst nees necessitate the signing of such correspondence by junior officers, an indication is to be given that the action is "By Direction" if appropriate, or that the Unit Commander is absent on duty (AOD), absent on leave (AOL), etc.

4. In cases where correspondence is to be referred to a further authority for action, eg. AHQ, units are to forward to this HQ sufficient copies of all relevant documents and letters to enable the next addressee to be furnished with all the facts without the necessity for photocopying. This will then eliminate this costly and time consuming process.

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98. THE OVAL SPORTS GROUND

1. Complaints are continually being received regarding vehs driving on the OVAL. This invariably occurs during some specific function such as large athletic meetings etc.

2. Vehs crossing the running track cause very considerable damage making the track unusable and this in turn necessitates closure of the ground and expensive repair work.

3. It is appreciated that it is essential on occasions to dump heavy items of equipment on site. If this is necessary all vehs will use the extreme outside edge of the ground. Portable items must however be carried onto the site.

4. Sub units are to ensure that all drivers are worned of the above orders and that attention is drawn to it once every three months.

(BRO 24/67)

99. PARKING AND DRIVING OF VEHICLES ON HQ BDE PARADE GROUND

1. No military or private vehicles are to be parked or driven over the HQ Bde Parade Ground with the following exceptions:

a. Cars of personnel attending presentations in the Bde Presentation Hall.

b. Landrovers and trailers loading and unloading at HQ. 28 Bde and Sig Sqn stores.

(BRO 25/67)

100. SOLDIERS EMPLOYING AMAHS PRIVATELY

1. The attention of all cub unit commanders is drawn to ARO 245/64, particularly para 4, 6, 7 and Annex ¹A¹. A requirement within the terms of entitlement to Married Accompanied rates of Local Overseas Allowance is that where a soldier employs a servant privitely he MUST protect himself against claims by his employee for injury arising out of such employment by means of Employers Idability Insurance. Provision for this is included within the rule of Local Overseas Allowance.

2. a. Every married soldier is to sign the following certificate as part of his arrival documentation:

"I certify that when I employ a domestic servant I will take out an Employment Liability Insurance Policy in the terms of para 6 of ARO 245/64".

This certificate is to be preceded by the contents of paras 6 and 7 of ARO 245/64 and is to be witnessed.

b. The certificate is to be filed with soldier's documents.

3. Once a quarter sub units are to call in policies and check that they are current. Where a policy is found to be lapsed (or does not exist) insurance is to be effected forthwith by the soldier or if he fails to do so his allowance stopped as at the date of check.

4. Personnel who have not yet completed certific tes required by para 2 above are to do so forthwith.

3. Admin Coy are warned in for rations for evening meal 23 and 28 Feb 67. OVERNIGHT EXPENSES OF DEPENDANTS ATTENDING SPECIALIST APPOINTEME

1. Approval has been given for the reimbursement of reasonable accommodation and meal costs, in cases where a dependant of a member is referred by a service medical officer to a specialist, and the appointment involves an overnight stay away from home. This is subject to evidence of expenditure being produced, and the concurrence of the Treasury Representative, Singapore being obtained.

2. Members concerned will be required to contribute an amount equivalent to half the amount for food, for the member and his wife as shown in the scale of living costs.

3. Where a parent accompanies a child or children referred to a specialist involving an overnight stay, the member's contribution will be as described in paragraph 2 above, plus the additional element for the child or children concerned.

4. AHQ Administrative Instruction 6/64 will be amended in due course.

(AAF RO 47/67)

107. SAFETY HAZARD - GRENADES HE M26 AND MP M34

1. Information received from UK indicates the existence of a possible safety hazard with projected grenades of the above types.

2. A dangerous condition can arise if the grenade is fired from a rifle with the safety pin of the fuze still in position. It would appear that the pin can shear on strike and if the grenade is partially buried, the safety lever can be held in position by the earth. Any movement of such a grenade could cause the lever to fly off and allow the striker to grinte the fuze.

3. Provided that normal safety precautions are observed and all blind grenades are destroyed in situ without actually touching the grenade, accidents will be averted.

4. This hazard is drawn to all su-unit's attention, however, in view of the dangerous conditions of such grenades, which may appear to be safe in view of the presence of the safety lever.

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108. DOMESTIC SERVANTS - MALAYA

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Ref 4 RAR RO 310/65 is reproduced below:

1. Vef 27 Jun 64, the entitlement for the provision of donestic servants to eligible married accompanied members in MALAYA ceased. From that date, local allowances payable to these members were increased by an amount approximating the wages that were paid to the dervant or servants through previous arrangements with the War Department. Henceforth, members who wish to employ a servant or servants, part or full time, are required to employ and pay such servants under private arrangements. The increase in allowances to eligible married accompanied members will not be conditional on the member employing domestic servants; on the contrary, the employment or otherwise of domestic servants will be the member's own personal discretion.

2. Those married accompanied members resident in a hotel, hostel etc. will continue to be reimbursed the costs of laundry charges in accordance with Financial Administrative Instruction No 451, para 142.

3. It will be noted that the contents of this Order relates to Anehs only gardeners or kebuns will continue to be provided under existing arrangements.

4. The employment of domestic servents, to include engaging and payment will be the responsibility of the member.

Responsibility of the Member

5. When a member desires to engage domestic help under private arrangements, he will be held personally responsible for the following:

a. <u>Medical Examination</u>, Menbers are required to obtain a certificate of modical fitness for the servant before engaging the servant concerned. This medical examination will be carried out at the nearest medical centre at public exponse. Arrangements for this medical examination will be the member's responsibility.

b. Employer's Insurance

- (1) Members engaging a servent are required to protect themselves against Claims by their employees for injury arising out of their employment by means of Employer's Liability Insurances. These policies have an annual premium of approximately eight dollars per servant. The costs of this insurance are included in the increased allowances.
- (2) When making application for these incre sed allowances members will be required to endorse their claim with the following statement:

"When I employ a dimestic servant or servants, I will take out an appropriate Employer's Liability Insurance Policy for each servent so employed on or before engaging such servants."

- (3) Members are to be advised that the Commonwealth of AUSTR.LIA will not accept liability for the Compensation to a soldier against employee claims.
- (4) Sub units will advise members on how to take out these insúrance policies, ff required by the member concerned.

RESTRICTED

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- c. <u>Payment of Servants</u>. Members are responsible for the payment of their servant or servants on a monthly basis, or at a more frequent interval as agreed with the servant. Members are to be instructed that they will maintain a suitable wages book showing payments made to the servant or servants and their signature for receipt. This wages book will be maintained as a record of wages payments only as a safeguard for the member.
- d. <u>Security</u>. Members will ensure that privately employed servants are screened and issued with security passes.

Conditions of Service

6. For guidance to eligible members, the conditions of service for domestic servants in the past are given below:

- a. Pay of \$120 per month. (Cook andhs in officers employ \$137). Pay is made in arrears.
- b. One day off per week.
- c. Six days paid leave per year.
- d. Fourteen days notice of discharge or fourteen days pay in lieu, with the exception that under serious disciplinary conditions, instant dismissel is possible, without the requirement for fourteen days pay in lieu.

Donestic Servant Allowance - Effective from 27 Jun 64

7. The allowance is credited to the member's paybook, on a daily basis, on application on a form MALAYA Pay 3 lodged with Unit Pay Representative. This application will include the member's rank and family state, to allow the grant of the appropriate increase, together with a statement in regards to Employer Liability Insurance. (See sub para 8b. (3) above.

8. The allowance will be credited to an eligible member under the following conditions:-

- a. While resident in MALAYA in other than a hotel, hostel, etc (SINGAPORE and EAST MALAYSIA are non-entitled areas).
- b. If a member is transferred to a non-entitled ares, or to an hotel, hostel, etc, at such short notice, beyond the control of the member concerned, that it is not possible to give the required notice of dismissal to servants employed by the member his CO or OC may authorise the payment of the increase allowance for sufficient days to cover the outstanding period. This period will NOT exceed fourteen days.
- c. The increased allowances will be continued during the absence of a member and his family on approved leave up to a maximum of sixty days, subject to his return to the area on completion of leave.
- d. If a member returns to AUSTRALIA in advance of his family to meet service requirements, the additional allowance will be continued while his family remain in MALAYA.

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Promulgation

9. Sub units will ensure th t details contained herein are promulz ted to all members concerned, and are bought to the notice of future reinforc ment members, where applicable.

Registration of Neuly Employed Anchs

10. All married members are required to advise MQI when they employ a new anah for security purposes.

11. Subsequent discharge of an anch must also be advised.

12. Copies of the proform for advising MQI are held within Coys.
