209. MISUSE OF SERVICE TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES

- Recent check of signal message traffic have revealed that unauthorised private telegrams originated by persons in this Command have been sent through Service channels.
- With the exception of Concessional Telegrams authorised by DCI 190/64, private telegrams are NOT to be sent over Service networks.

210. CASUALTY EVACUATION - CIVILIANS

- Civilian sick are not to be evacuated by air to KUCHING without the authorisation of the Regimental Medical Officer with whom the case should be discussed by radio if necessary.
- In the case of clear cut and obvious emergencies the local commander may authorise the evacuation.
- HQ West Bde Admin Standing Orders are being amended accordingly.

211. DUTY FREE CONCESSIONS TO THE FORCES IN BORNEO

- The NAAFI organisation imports beer, wines, spirits and tobaccos into Borneo free of duty. This is a concession given by the State Govt of Sabah, Brunei, and Sarawak for the sole benefit of members of the Forces serving in these territories.
- Any abuse of this privilege is liable to result in the withdrawal of duty-free concessions. All ranks are reminded that duty-free goods :-
 a. Must not be sold or given away to civilians.
 b. May not be consumed in civilian homes, clubs, hotels, etc;

212. AMMUNITION ACCIDENTS, PREMATURES, DEFECTS AND UNEXPLODED BOMBS

- The attention of all units is drawn to paras 1107-1109 (inclusive) of WEST Bde Admin Standing Orders.
- There have been two instances lately of unexploded bombs being removed by the finder, and one in which the object was destroyed by the unit concerned without reference to this HQ's. It cannot be over-emphasised that such practice is not only extremely dangerous, but also may deprive the RAOC, who are responsible in this field, of some invaluable information on ammunition.
- Units are reminded that ammunition accidents, unusual occurrences involving ammunition, or unidentified objects are to be reported to DADOS at this Headquarters.

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213. TRANSPORT TO KUCHING

1. Due to the heavy commitments on unit transport, tasks to KUCHING are co-ordinated by Tpt, to get maximum use from vehicles to plan tasks correctly, it is essential that Tpt know exact details of all tasks, to avoid the confusion that has resulted in the past due to insufficient information when bookings were made.
2. All tasks must be submitted through the Transport Officer. Late bookings will get late consideration and this could mean no vehicle. Priorities will be decided where necessary only by the Battalion 2IC or CM.

214. REPORTING OF FIRES

Reference A: Boards of Inquiry and Related Subjects 1963.
Reference B: LFB 4418/4 Ord dated 18th January 1965.

1. Formations and units are to comply strictly with Reference A. In particular, attention is drawn to paras 156 (b), 164 and 165 on respect of all fires which damage public or service property.
2. Formations and units are to ensure that after any fires, reports are to be signalled immediately to this headquarters in accordance with Reference B, para 6.
3. The Command Fire Advisor (CFA) at HQ FARELF (ORD 10) must be given an opportunity to attend personally or to be represented at all inquiries or investigations on fires. For that reason, copies of the reports referred to in para 2 above should be signalled to HQ FARELF or CFA.

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OFFICERS WITNESSING DOCUMENTS

1. Attention is drawn to Part IV of the Defence Force Regulations whereby it is provided that an officer of the rank of Captain or above may administer oaths, take affidavits of and attest the execution of documents by a member of the Defence Force while on service outside AUSTRALIA. The document must relate to matters arising under law of the Commonwealth or a State of AUSTRALIA.
2. An officer after signing the document must legibly write, type or stamp after the signature his name and rank.
3. The Regulations governing the administration of oaths etc are contained in Part 3 of the Army Law Manual. In effect, an authorised officer in FARELF may sign any document requiring signature before a J.P. Commissioner for Declarations or Commissioner for taking affidavits.
4. Units may find it helpful to have rubber stamps made, containing the information shown below for use by authorised officers. This is not a requirement of the regulations.

222. CROSSING CAUSEWAY SINGAPORE - JOHORE

Repeated below is the text of a signal received from 17 DIV 9.0

1. With effect from 15 Jul 66 the joint administrative system for the States of Malaya and Singapore will be revoked by the Malaysian Govt.
2. After 15 Jul 66 Malaysian Govt will require people entering the States of Malaya from Singapore to hold the fol documents :-
 - a. Aliens are to have passport carrying visa for entry into Malaysia. This includes all alien dependants who do not have Singapore ID cards see delta below, and is necessary until and while a decision is made on the acceptability of the proposed British Services ID card Singapore which is ~~for~~ issue to all civilians and dependants in lieu of a Singapore ID card.
 - b. Commonwealth citizens who do not hold Singapore or States Malaya ID cards are to carry passports.
 - c. Members of visiting forces (ie, All British and Commonwealth Forces are to have service ID cards.
 - d. Holders of Singapore and States of Malaya ID cards are to carry these only.
3. Probable that immigration control post will initially be set up in same location as Johore customs post.
4. Any incidents are to be reported through usual channels to this HQ as soon as possible.
5. ~~Ensure~~ Ensure all civilian organisations are informed (eg NAAFI, AKC, SSAFA, WVS, BFBS, CVWW etc).
6. Please give this the maximum publicity.



ARMY HELICOPTERS EMPLANING/DEPLANING DRILLS

LITREP NUMBER THREE

General

1. An incursion was made into the BAU area in early June. Subsequent follow up actions mounted by 4 RAR and 2/7 GR resulted in accounting for the complete incursion party with the exception of one Chinese guide.
2. Reports have been received which indicate Bn HQ of 203 BRIMOB battalion may have moved forward from SELUAS towards RISAU.
3. There are further indications of 514 Battalion's deployment SOUTH-EAST of SELUAS.
4. The gun located at RISAU fired into SARAWAK approximately 2,000 yards SOUTH of STASS on 13 Jun 66. There now may be six or seven guns in 203 Bn's area.
5. A report has been received that there were 100 PASANDHA at SELUAS on 3 Jul 66. The reason PASANDHA was formed was to carry out operations against SARAWAK during the peace talks, and after the peace treaty was signed.

MANJAR II Incursion into the BAU Area

6. On 10 Jun 66, at approximately 1900 hours, a Border Scout from Kpg SIBURUH (1360) arrested a Chinese suspect and handed him over to the Bau police. Initial interrogation reports stated this Chinese said he crossed the border on 4 Jun 66 accompanied by one or two other Chinese and six 'Raiders'. The Raiders returned to Indonesia after seven hours. The route used was the RAYA ridge.
7. Subsequent interrogation produced a number of changing stories, however the following points now appear correct:
 - a. He was briefed at SELUAS with about 50 other people - TNI, THKU and Chinese.
 - b. He crossed the border as part of MANJAR II on 4 Jun 66 (MANJAR II now believed to consist of 16 TNI and 2 Chinese guides).
 - c. Subject, another guide, and 6 TNI left the remaining 10 TNI on about 9 Jun 66 for TUNDONG area.
 - d. At the time of his arrest, he was returning to RV with the 6 TNI and one Chinese guide.
8. At approximately 2300 hours 11 Jun 66, a local from Kpg PLAMAN SEMAYA (1160) reported to the BAU police station that a party of ten uniformed men had come to his house at about 2200 hours. They asked if the SF visited that area at night, and was he armed. The local replied no to both questions. They then asked for food, stating that they had not eaten for two days. Before the local's wife had cooked rice, the armed men ate Durians, salt and drank boiled water. They asked the local to guide them to TUNDONG. He refused, but guided them to a track which led in the correct direction and gave them instructions. Without waiting to eat the cooked food, the armed men left at approximately 2230 hours. The local counted ten men.
9. The local described the armed men as non-Chinese, who spoke Malay with a peculiar accent. They wore a hat similar to SF, were dressed in green or khaki uniform. He was not sure as it was raining, there was mud on their uniforms, and his house was only dimly lit. They wore a thin waist belt. On the right of the belt was a magazine pouch containing four magazines. On the left were two objects wrapped in cloth which he thought were grenades. The description of the weapons agreed with the description of the Soviet 7.62mm Assault Rifle. He later chose the KALASHNIKOV from an identification manual.

10. Comment. This information was received at 0050 hours 12 Jun 66. One company was immediately sent to investigate if the Sg SELALANG could be crossed, established it could, then moved to TUNDONG. TUNDONG was cordoned and movement both in and out was controlled by first light.

11. F2. At approximately 0900 hours 12 Jun 66, a Border Scout handed over a Chinese youth to a company which was moving into the TUNDONG area from the WEST. The Chinese youth was questioned and stated two strangers in civilian clothes approached him for assistance to cross the Sg SELALANG and he had complied with their request. The youth stated he spoke to the strangers in DYAK, however they answered him in MALAY. The strangers were not armed.

12. Comment. This report was later confirmed by a policeman who saw the strangers at GROGO. They had approached from the WEST, and asked the people at the GROGO bus stop if there was a bus to TUNDONG. When told the bus only went to BAU, the strangers moved off to the EAST. The PC said he thought they were Indonesians but he didn't arrest them because of the bulges in their pockets which he thought were grenades. It is now known from captured documents that these two men were TNI soldiers who were looking for the party which had previously left for TUNDONG.

13. At 1600 hours 13 Jun 66, a Border Scout reported he had seen tracks for five men at Gg. API (0660). He said the tracks were heading WEST along the RAYA Ridge, and that he estimated they had been made that morning. He also reported the same track had been used 'a few days' earlier as there were broken saplings and twigs indicating movement to the EAST. (Comment: Probably the same track that was used by MANJAR II on the way into the BAU area).

14. Comment. The tracker team and BS were moved by helicopter to the BS. kampong. The BS guided the tracker team to the tracks by 0730 hours 15 Jun 66, who confirmed the tracks were now 24 hours old. There was some disagreement whether the tracks were made by five men or more than five men, however as agreement could not be reached, tracks for 'five' continued to be reported.

15. The tracks were followed from Gg. API along the top of the ridge, to G. UNDA (9959), where they were washed out by rain. Two resting places, each for five men, were found at 982594 and 985597, 400 yards apart. At that stage the short distance between halts was explained by water being found at the second halt. It is now thought to have been made by two different parties of five.

16. At 0815 hours 15 Jun 66 contact was made at 958578. One enemy was thought to have been wounded. The enemy, who were on higher ground used this ground to good advantage, used good fire and movement, and by heavy accurate fire, pinned down attempted outflanking movements. Due to the enemy occupying an old prepared SF position in a rocky outcrop, artillery fire was called down in an attempt to dislodge them. The artillery fire proved ineffective because of the terrain, so a deep right rear hook was launched. After a heavy fire fight, in which the enemy expended an estimated 400 rounds, the position was found to be clear by 1120 hours.

17. Tracks for five men heading NORTH were found and followed. The tracks then turned WEST and contoured in a Westerly direction approximately 250 yards NORTH of the ridge top.

18. At approximately 1740 hours 15 Jun 66 contact was made with five enemy at 934578. In a fire fight which lasted 30 minutes, 4 enemy were killed, and one escaped SOUTH. We had two casualties, one of whom later died. The enemy dead, documents, weapons and equipment were evacuated on 16 Jun 66.

19. At 1805 hours 15 Jun 66, a transmission was received on 47 Mcs in Indonesian. The text of the transmission appears to be:

"2 Pl to assist the contact, if they see any helicopters, they are to shoot them down".

20. This transmission was on a company net which had suffered a lot of interference during 15 Jun 66. They reported that the interference was in Indonesian with brief messages, using apparently good radio procedure.

21. Comment. For this transmission to be received on VHF, it would have to have been transmitted from either somewhere on the RAYA ridge, or from a station in INDONESIA. If it came from the RAYA, it was first thought that the fifth man who escaped from the second contact was carrying a transmitter/receiver. No proof has been received that this was the case.

22. On SB information, 2/7 GR deployed into the area of 158612. The days activities resulted in three INDONS killed, two wounded and captured, and one captured unscathed. Interrogation reports still to follow. Again documents were captured.

23. Three F6 reports indicate that six enemy including two wounded (one in hip, one in hand) returned to KINDAU about 18 Jun 66.

24. A B3 report indicates that a party of 27 including two wounded arrived at SILUAS, date uncertain.

25. Summary of Main Parts in Captured Docus.

- a. Two MANJAR teams plus a reserve of approximately 12.
- b. Tasks. To establish pockets in the BAU and MATANG areas for subversive, and eventually offensive operations.
- c. Rfts. Further rfts and eqpt were subsequently to be infiltrated into the pockets.
- c. Comms. A system for receipt and transmission of messages.

INTERPRET NUMBER FOUR

General

1. Further information has been received, which indicates that PASSANDHA are still in SELUAS.
2. Two reports have been received, that indicate that there has possibly been an incursion of a Chinese party during June.
3. Confirmation has been received, that mortars are now supporting 203 BRIMOB Bn. These mortars have fired, with some of the rounds possibly landing our side of the Border.
4. There appears to be a definite increase in enemy intelligence gathering activities.

PASSANDHA.

5. B3. Sub-source was in SELUAS on 9 July, and states there were still approx 100 PASSANDHA there.
6. Eight man PASSANDHA patrols, have continued between SELUAS and BABANG, there being three patrols between 2-9 Jul. However, these patrols have NOT patrolled from BABANG towards the Border.

These patrols report to SEKSI, and they stay the night, with either SEKSI or PELOPOR.

7. Since the arrival of AH JOO, AJIS and NYONDAU in BABANG, these patrols have liaised with them. Source saw the word P. SANDHA written in BLACK on WHITE background over the left pocket.

8. Comment. Source does NOT know the reason for these patrols. The change in spelling, may mean that PASSANDHA have been renamed, or it may just be an abbreviation.

9. B3. 21 Jul. It is reported that sometime in August, all BRIMOB in the BABANG area will be withdrawn, and PASSANDHA will occupy their posts. Sub-source did NOT know which Unit will be called PASSANDHA, but stated there were still many RPKAD in SELUAS.

10. Comment. If this information is correct, the length of the tour by BRIMOB would be much shorter than the accepted 12 months duration. The mention of PASSANDHA moving forward, is significant, and does not coincide with the talks of peace by BRIMOB.

However, the withdrawal of the BRIMOB, would not effect the overall Military situation, but would look politically good for INDONESIA.

11. Some of 514 Bn are still NOT accounted for. (see para 57) It appears likely that 514 Bn could be involved in the formation of PASSANDHA, and therefore, the missing elements of 514 Bn may be part of PASSANDHA. It is known that approx 64 members of 514 Bn were trained by RPKAD.

Possible Chinese Incursion.

12. B2. At a meeting in SINIAWAN on 8 Jul, the members of the meeting were re-assured that the Chinese were NOT being persecuted, and were told to prepare for 13 armed persons, mainly Chinese who were at Kpg. STINGANG on 18 Jun.
13. C3. On approx 20 Jul, information was received that a party of 12, plus possibly a guide, would be moving from the TUNDONG area, because of the SF activity. Their reported destination was MATANG, moving via BATU KAWA

14. Comment. Investigations were carried out in the STINGGANG-SEKORIS area, with NIL result. This information is thought to be more than a morale booster, because of the figures mentioned. Connect with INTREP Number 3 para 62.

Flares.

15. 16 Jul. From STASS. Two reports were received :

- a. 4 Flares on a bearing of 3450 at 0240 hours.
- b. 2 Flares on a bearing of 3200 at 0410 hours.

It was thought the flares were on the RAYA ridge.

16. Comment. These flares were NOT seen by BOKAH Base, indicating the flares were probably on the SOUTHERN side of the RAYA. The findings and positions of the flares, indicates movement to the WEST. Follow up yielded nothing.

Mortars.

17. C2. A report has been received that a Company of 81mm Mortars has now arrived to support 203 BRIBOB Bn.

18. Comment. A Company of Mortars appears to be an excessive number, a Platoon of six Mortars is thought to be more likely.

19. The following reports of Mortar fire have been received:

- a. 17 Jul. 12 Mortar bombs fired from an area thought to be RISAU (9045) from 1300 hours to 1415 hours. Impact area NOT known.
- b. 19 Jul. 8 rounds Mortar fire reported between 0940 hours and 1040 hours, on a bearing of 190 degrees from 921572.
- c. 21 Jul. 12 probable Mortar explosions reported between 1700 hours and 2100 hours, by SF patrols, BS and Loc Det at STASS. One unconfirmed plot of baseplate, was 907486. It is thought that 5 or 6 rounds landed our side of the Border. Arty Int investigating.

20. Comment. The last two occasions the guns opposite STASS have fired, have subsequently been shown to be a cover for activity in other areas. NO indication that this is the case this time has so far been received. The range from baseplate to impact area appears too great for any known Mortar.

TNKU

21. C2. In early July, the TUA KAMPONG of TRINGUS was invited to a meeting in SIDING, to discuss the re-introduction of trading between the two Kampongs.

22. The meeting was held on 7 July at the TUA KAMPONG's house at SIDING. The TRINGUS party was surprised to find that the meeting was chaired by PANGLIMA DAGANG. Also at the meeting were PANGLIMA GUNTOR, AH RON, AH AK, PALAM, all from BOEMBONG. With these men were four JAVANESE, and a BRUNEI Malay, who was described as 40 years old, dark hair, long face, and a very close friend of SUIP BIN SAHL. All of this party had arrived in SIDING on 7 Jul 66, having travelled from BOEMBONG. They were dressed in OGs with TNKU flashes and badges, and were apparently armed.

23. DAGANG's speech is summarised as follows:

- a. Civilians and Border Scouts from TRINGUS can enter SIDING at any time, to visit and trade. Should they be arrested, the people of SIDING will fight for their release.
- b. In return, if civilians from SIDING, OPR (comment - Home Guard) TNI, or DAGANG himself came to the TRINGUS area, their presence should NOT be reported to the SARAWAK authorities.

24. DAGANG asked the TRINGUS party if they agreed with the above, and because the TUA KAMPONG was frightened, he agreed. He was given a letter which apparently outlined the agreement, and was told NOT to disclose the contents to the SARAWAK authorities. DAGANG also stated that if the agreement was NOT strictly adhered to, he would completely destroy TRINGUS Kampong.

25. Source was later asked by DAGANG to come to BOEMBONG on 24 Jul, to collect five letters for the TUA KAMPONG of TRINGUS and his friends, plus sets of TNKU flashes and badges. When this material was delivered, the TUA KAMPONG would hold a meeting, and if the people were in agreement with the arrangements already made, then the INDONESIANS would be free to cross the Border in relative safety.

26. Later, Source spoke with AH RON who is a personal friend, and AH RON stated that a meeting of a similar nature would be arranged between SIDING and GUMBANG for the 24 Jul, presided over by AH KUAM. It was hoped to arrange other meetings between BABANG and SERIKIN and STASS, presided over by DAGANG. AH RON added that the process of obtaining the co-operation of the SARAWAK Kampongs, was part of a general plan, but did not go into details.

27. Source was also questioned about ALAN BIN DELI, and was asked to try to contact him. AH RON said that DELI was a traitor and had refused to co-operate, and who would have been killed by the TNI had he NOT escaped. (Comment. DELI is a refugee)

28. F6. Source spent the night 7/8 Jul in SIDING. On arrival at SIDING, he saw eight soldiers accompanied by two civilians, who had all arrived from BOEMBONG. The party left early next morning to return to BOEMBONG.

29. Of the eight soldiers, three were JAVANESE, two MALAY, two IBAN, and one CHINESE. The leader of the party was an IBAN, PANGLEMA DAGANG, the other IBAN was PANGLEMA GUNTOR. One of the CHINESE was CHONG AH KUAM. The two civilians were from BENGKAWAN, and were merely acting as porters. The two IBANS and one of the JAVANESE were dressed in camouflaged uniforms, while the others wore OGs. They all wore peaked caps, of either camouflage pattern or OG colour, appropriate to the rest of their uniform. They wore civilian shoes.

30. On their caps was a small yellow star. Below the left epaulette, each wore a metal TNKU flash (coloured WHITE on RED background). Above the breast pocket was the flash:



31. Five of the party carried rifles, while the other three carried Stens. Each man carried one hand Grenade in a pouch on the RIGHT hip, plus a bandolier of ammunition.

32. In the evening, the Kampong people were called to the TUA KAMPONG's house, where DAGANG made a speech. Source reported the text as follows: "In November, we will try to go over to SARAWAK, because MALAYSIA will withdraw British Troops from SARAWAK in October. We will go TRINGUS and GUMBANG. The INDONESIAN government will support us in arms and ammunition. All of you in SIDING are our men, and now that the time has come to move to SARAWAK, you must all keep quiet and not talk to SARAWAKIANS about this."

33. After the formal speech, a general discussion took place, in which the Source heard DAGANG mention that there were 40 other TNKU in BOEMBONG, and that he was their leader. He also said that they were being supplied with food by the INDONESIAN Army.

34. Comment. There is obvious discrepancy in the F6 report. It is unlikely that DAGANG would have made the reported speech, knowing that there were members from SARAWAK present, if he did not want them to be informed.

35. DAGANG is a known TNKU leader, accredited with the rank of Lt Col. It is thought that DAGANG was involved in the attack on TRINGUS in 1964.

36. It is possible that the TNKU are now biding their time, attempting to gain new recruits, and especially Intelligence.

37. Source will proceed to BOEMBONG (as requested in para 25) and future meetings, if held, will be 'attended' if possible.

SEKSI.

38. F6. 7 Jul. Source stated that SUKATMA of SEKSI, was recently replaced by a new man named JATNA, also of SEKSI. In addition to JATNA, two other members of SEKSI occasionally visit BABANG to assist him.

39. Source described JATNA as Bn SEKSI, and SUKATMA as Coy SEKSI. SUKATMA was replaced because he exploited the Traders for his personal gains. Source did not know JATNA's rank, but stated that SEKSI in SEDUAS lived in the Officer's Mess.

The duties of SEKSI include checking strangers controlling Traders, and mediating between civilians and soldiers. Source did NOT know the meaning of SEKSI, but equated their work to that of the SF FIO.

40. B3. 9 Jul. On the 7 Jul, JATNA was replaced by a Land Dyak, whose name is as yet unknown. JATNA was apparently only 'caretaking' the appointment. SEKSI personnel prior to 7 Jul, were JATNA, SUANDI, ADANG and MAHDI. Present personnel are the Land Dyak, ADANG, MAHDI and a JAVANESE, whose name is NOT yet known. Two of these men are Bn SEKSI, the other two are Coy SEKSI. They all live in the same house, which was previously occupied by SUKATMA, and then JATNA.

41. The Land Dyak has told the people of BABANG to trade as much as they wish with SARAWAK, and has guaranteed there will be NO trouble. He has so far always worn civilian clothes, and even some soldiers take them for civilians. On 8 Jul, the Land Dyak and two of his assistants went on patrol dressed as civilians with parangs. They had a pistol hidden under their clothing. Source was told that SEKSI are Intelligence. This patrol moved towards the G. JAGOI, and were back within three hours.

42. Comment. SEKSI appears to control movement in and out of BABANG. Traders have to obtain permission to come to SERIKIN to Trade. It must be assumed that they would be using the Trading parties to gain information, although one F6 Source when questioned on this subject, stated that as far as he knows, Traders were not questioned on their return. This does not mean, however, that SEKSI do NOT have their own Sources.

Trading parties have been very large, over the past few weeks, in some cases as many as 80 in one party. A Trading party arrives about every five days, although this routine is NOT fixed. A message has been sent to the Traders from BABANG, to restrict the size of the party, but NOT the frequency which they may come.

Letters.

43. Four letters have been received from SEKSI and Police Officers from BABANG, stating they wish to arrange a meeting. They say they will meet with representatives of Administration, Police or SF at any time or place, to discuss the terms connected with the ending of Confrontation, mainly Border Security. They promise a safe pass to anyone who meets with them.

44. Comment. Copies of these letters have been forwarded to SB KUCHING for action.

BRIMOB

45. B3. The name of the CO of 203 Bn BRIMOB, is UDAYA, but Source did NOT know his rank. (comment. Previous reports stated the CO was a Lt Col.)

46. F6. 7 Jul - BABANG. BRIMOB do NOT like the CHINESE in contrast to the DIPONOCORO troops, who were previously stationed at BABANG. When the BRIMOB first arrived, 5 CHINESE came up from SELUAS, and were promptly sent back to SELUAS. BRIMOB explained they were Police and NOT Military. The BRIMOB troops are at present leading a very relaxed life, and are just waiting the order to leave. Recently there has been no patrolling by BRIMOB.

47. F6. 7 Jul. 'A' Coy recently replaced 'B' Coy in the BABANG area. Coy HQ is in BABANG, where there are about 40-50 troops. There are approx 20 in TEPOI, and an unknown number in KORUH. Source states the number of troops in KINDAU, is about the same as in BABANG. 'A' Coy is commanded by RASIDI who wears one star on his epaulette.

48. Comment. This information confirms previous reports on BRIMOB dispositions. It is thought that 'A' and 'B' Companies occupy BABANG-RISAU, with 'C' Coy near BELIDA. Bn HQ was previously assessed as being at a Track Junction (8745)

49. F6. 8 Jul - BABANG. Source stated there was a marked decrease in patrolling activity during recent weeks. There are now only two or three patrols per month, (strength 5-7 men) which move towards G. BRUNEI and are usually back in BABANG within an hour.

50. B3. Between 1-12 Jul, the BRIMOB did NOT patrol from BABANG. BRIMOB were urging the civilians to go out hunting, telling them Confrontation is now over, and there is peace. BRIMOB have recently hunted in the area near BABANG.

51. B3. 21 Jul. The BRIMOB in BABANG are always talking about peace to the local people, and that they hope to hold a meeting very shortly between the people of BABANG, SERIKIN and STASS. They urged the locals of BABANG to be friendly and honest with the people of SERIKIN and STASS. The BRIMOB have stated that they want:

- a. A fuller understanding between the Kampongs across the Border.
- b. To calm down anger and hatred.
- c. Peace and happiness for all.

52. Comment. The relationship between BABANG and SERIKIN appears particularly good, and NOT one of anger and hatred. Trade relationships are good, and fairly regular Trading parties come from BABANG to SERIKIN, sometimes staying overnight at SERIKIN. The only known clash was in Nov 1963, when a person from BABANG was killed by a party from STASS in a clash with TNKU.

53. F6. There are 30 BRIMOB troops in BELIDA, plus 10 BRIMOB Mortar troops. In KINDAU, there is a similar number of BRIMOB and BRIMOB Mortar troops. Each garrison has 1 x No 8 Mortars, plus 2 small Mortars. None of these Mortars have fired since the arrival of the main body of 203 BRIMOB Bn, when about 10 rounds were fired. Source stated the KINDAU camp lies half way between OLD KINDAU and NEW KINDAU (distance approx 1½ miles) The BELIDA camp is about 300 yards from BELIDA, along the BELIDA-KINDAU track.

54. Comment. NO previous reports have been received to indicate the Mortars have fired. Apart from this, the information reported is part confirmation of previous reports and appears to be correct. No 8 Mortars are medium Mortars.

514 Dn.

55. F6. On approx 5 Jul, two boat-loads of TNI (approx 80 men) left BOEMBONG for SELUAS. Sub Source saw them leaving, but was not close enough to see their insignia. Source heard that these troops were going to SELUAS for a meeting, purpose unknown. When Source travelled via BOEMBONG on 11 Jul, these troops had NOT returned, and as far as he could determine, there were only two wireless operators in BOEMBONG.

56. C3. There are 30 BRANJAJA in a camp on the EAST side of the S.AJONG.

57. Comment. The current assessment of 514 Dn prior to this report was:

- a. Dn HQ - SELUAS
- b. Coy - BANGUM
- c. Coy (-) - BOEMBONG
- d. Coy - TADAN
- e. Pl - SEBOEDJIT

This means at least one company are still NOT accounted for. It is possible the remainder are at SELUAS, or further to the rear, possibly at SANGAU. Further reports are necessary to clarify the situation.

Hearts and Minds.

58. F6. There are 24 soldiers in Sources own Kampong (TAKE 8947) who are dressed in a camouflaged uniform with a white flower on the left arm. The word TABAN is written above the flower.

These troops had just finished repairing the village school, and Source heard that they were next to move to BELIDA.

59. F6. 5 Jul. Source from BADANG heard that there were approx 20 troops in TAKE, engaged in building a new school. Source did NOT know who they were, but heard that they lived with the civilians.

60. Comment. These troops sound similar to an organisation called BERDEKARI (ref Bde INTSUM No 111) which was formed in late 1965. Its task was to improve the conditions of the Rural people. Trained workers were provided with green uniforms, which had a flower badge on the sleeve, with the word SOSIAL. A local HQ was thought to be situated in SELUAS in Jan 1966.

Topography

61. F6 Source stated that the road between SANGAU and SELUAS, started at the beginning of this year, is now complete. It has a mud surface, and can take two jeeps 'at a pinch'. Source understood the purpose of the road, was to link SINGKAWANG with KUCHING, for the era of peace that would follow the end of Confrontation.

62. Comment. It has been thought for some time, that the road between SANGAU and SELUAS was usable. A possible reason that the road has not been used, is a lack of transport.

PONTIANAK

63. 03. Source describes this town as lawless. Marauding bands of Malays attempt to rob and burn CHINESE property. The Governor of this area of WEST KALILANTAN, an IBAN, appealed to the Dyaks to help protect the CHINESE population. The local MALAYS have an intense hatred for the Governor. The MALAYS stop local farmers, and any Traders, question them on the price they want for their goods, and if they consider the price too high, confiscate the goods. Prices in the shops are high, but there does NOT appear to be any shortage of any particular commodity. In Source's experience in this area, MALAY 10 cents is equivalent to 30 INDONESIAN Rupiahs.

64. Military identifications in this area, were DIPONOGORO troops wearing a large 'M' on their uniform, and some BRAWIJAJA troops. HANSIP (PERTAHANAN SIPIL-type of civil defence) were seen, but they were NOT armed. Source could NOT understand why the local police and HANSIP had such a lack of interest in the maintenance of law and order, or why the Governor should have to ask the Dyaks to assist.

Conclusion.

65. The military and the political situations are still confusing. With the continued presence of RPKAD and PASSANDHA at SELUAS, further incursions are likely. NO indication has as yet been received of dates and routes, however, it is considered the BRUNEI and JAGOI are distinct possibilities. Both these routes have been used before. Because of topography, the RAYA can NOT be discounted.

26. Comment - Summary of Fate of MANJAR II

MANJAR II is now thought to be accounted for as fol :-

- a. Seven TNI killed.
- b. Three TNI captured, incl 2 wounded.
- c. 6 TNI, incl 2 wounded, returned to Indonesia.
- d. One Chinese guide captured.
- e. One Chinese guide presumably still in the FUNGONG - SELALANG area.

27. MANJAR I

B3. On 13 Jun, approx 40 RPKAD crossed into SARAWAK along the G. RAYA. They were armed with KALASHNIKOVs and ARBALITES, and wore JG uniform. Later, 27, including two wounded, returned to SELUAS but source does not remember the date. The troops have now left SELUAS for SINGKAWAN.

28. F6. A party of 16, including two Chinese left SELUAS, stayed overnight at TAKE and then stayed in KINDAU before they left for SARAWAK. Another party, numbers unknown, guided by AH JIEI went into SARAWAK along the G. RAYA and met six men including two wounded (one hip, one hand) and brought them back to KINDAU, on about the 18th June.

29. F6. On the "Date of Incursion" (comment = date of contact = 15 Jun) radio contact was made and a party of 20 went forward to support the party in contact. This party of 20 came back to KINDAU on about 16 Jun, and stated that when they were in the jungle, they could not make any further radio contact. One day after this party of 20 returned to KINDAU, another party of six returned, two of whom were wounded, one in the hip, and one in the left hand. This party of six claimed there were still ten left in SARAWAK.

30. They wanted food, especially milk, and asked the locals from KINDAU to go to SERIKIN. The authorities at BABANG would not give permission. The party left KINDAU for SELUAS. (Source could not remember the date, but it must have been prior to 20 Jun.) Amongst the party of 20 was ADJIS who had previously been to JAVA, and had only recently returned to BABANG.

31. Comment

a. MANJAR II was almost certainly **part** of the 40 referred to in para 27 above.

b. There is no evidence that MANJAR I crossed into SARAWAK on or about 10 June as indicated in captured docs.

c. It was probable that the support party mentioned in para 40 was MANJAR I. This party met the six survivors of MANJAR II, incl two wounded, either inside SARAWAK or at KINDAU.

d. It is not known why MANJAR I did not carry out its task given in the Op Order, but it may be either of the following :-

(1) Increased SF activity.

(2) They met the party with the wounded.

(3) They were ordered not to continue at that time because of the fate of MANJAR II.

e. It is probable that MANJAR I with the six (incl two wounded), was the party of 27 which left SELUAS for SINGKAWAN.

Incursion of Chinese Party - 15-18 Jun

32. At approx 2100 hours 17 Jun, noises and voices were heard, and torches were seen approx 200 yards south of the second contact. Preparations for a dawn attack were made, however the 'birds' had flown. The tracker team follow up found tracks for 16 men which led EAST for approx 2,000 yards, then turned SOUTH then WEST and moved towards the border. The tracks being followed were estimated to be about 12 hours old. For the last 1500 yards, the tracker team reported that the enemy had been running when possible. It is thought that this party recrossed the border into Indonesia on 18 Jun.

33. On the morning of 18 Jun, a camp was found for 12 - 16 men near the border. It was estimated that this camp was used on the night 15/16 Jun, and about one month earlier. Tracks were followed which led NORTH, then North-West.

34. Comments

- a. It is thought that this party spent the night 15/16 Jun in the camp at 925565.
- b. They lay low on 16 and 17 Jun because of intense SF activity, and the contact at 1740 hrs on 15 Jun.
- c. They then moved NORTH and EAST during night 17/18 Jun and were heard by SF at 2100 hrs 17 Jun.
- d. After dawn 18 Jun there was considerable activity to follow up this party. They may have become frightened and turned SOUTH and WEST on morning 18 Jun, running across the border in haste.

35. B3. - 3 Jul 66.

On the 14 Jun, 21 Chinese and one Dyak named AJIS crossed into SARAWAK, using the G RAYA. The Chinese were all ex-SARAWAKIANS. This party returned about three days later. They are now all in SELUAS except for AJIS and one Chinese, AM JOO, who are both in BABING.

36. F6. Sub-source heard at BABING from a trader from KINDAU that three parties had left KINDAU for SARAWAK. He was unsure of dates, but insisted that it was in June. The first two parties were approx 20 strong, the third party approx 25 strong. There had been no contact with the first or second parties who did not intend to return. The third party left on about 13 Jun and returned on about 15 Jun. This party claimed that they had had a long range contact with the SF, and were happy to be home. They claimed that they could not get through, because of the SF on the RAYA. The composition of the party was a mixture of Chinese and RPF.

37. Comment

- a. Until the above report was received it was thought that the incursion party in para 32 - 36 above could have been either MANJAR I or the reserve group in the Op Order. Their apparently timid activities could not be explained and were out of character of troops in MANJAR II.
- b. The above reports indicate that this incursion party was in fact Chinese and accounts for their actions.

Reports from the BOKAH area

38. a. F6. Three men moved from Kpg STUNGKOR 9461 to 914621 and returned to STUNGKOR at approx 192400 hours Tracker pl investigation NFR.

The Formation and Roles of PASANDHA

44. B3. A source visited SILUAS on the 3 Jul 66 and states that there were approximately 100 PASANDHA there. They were wearing light brown uniforms with narrow stripes of a deeper brown. Over the left pocket is the word PASANDHA. They were armed with KALASHNIKOVs and AR15s. Of the 100, 30 were MALAY, 40 CHINESE and 30 RPKAD. PASANDHA came into existence at the beginning of June and includes all previous irregular troops plus any regular troops who wish to join it. By becoming members of PASANDHA regular troops become irregular troops. Source states that the reason for the formation of PASANDHA was the need to find a way to carry on operations against SARAWAK during the peace talks and after the peace treaty was signed, when it would no longer be possible to use regular troops.

45. The order for the formation of PASANDHA came from the Military Commander of West Kalimantan. Since the peace talks started all other troops have been forbidden to launch operations against SARAWAK. The 100 PASANDHA in SILUAS have recently arrived there from BENGKALANG. Their leader is a RPKAD Lt. There are altogether 7000 PASANDHA in West Kalimantan. Source urged alertness as the PASANDHA in SILUAS intend "slipping in" soon. However dates and routes are not known.

46. On the 19 Jun 66, 8 PASANDHA came up to BABANG from SILUAS. They stayed a couple of nights and then returned to SILUAS, being relieved by another party of 8. This process has continued and the last party of eight came up to BABANG on the 3 Jul 66 and is the fourth party to do so since the 19 Jun 66. When in BABANG they stay with the PELEPOR and PKR troops there.

47. Source has heard that some of these troops wish to join PASANDHA as they are no longer allowed to 'go over the other side', but could if they joined PASANDHA. While in BABANG these parties frequently go out on patrol and spend the night in the jungle. These patrols move towards the border in the direction of SIRIKIN, BRUBAI, KINDAU and GUNONG BRUNEI. Source does not know the reason for these visits and patrols.

48. Source stated that all those joining PASANDHA are given \$300. This is passed to them when they depart for SARAWAK.

49. F6. SELUAS - 3 Jun 66. Source saw many troops wearing uniforms he has never seen before. They were brown in colour with small vertical stripes. The composition of the party was Javanese (majority), Malays and Chinese. The troops were referred to as PASANDHA. Source claims the troops are well trained, well armed, and they said they were going to come 'over'.

Comment.

50. a. The reports of number are probably exaggerated, particularly the report of 7000 PASANDHA.
- b. One definition of PASANDHA (PASUKAN-SANDHI JUDHA) is SECRET WAR TEAM. These have been previously found in D Coy 1 Bn RPKAD, used as undercover troops. The tasks of PASANDHA are comparable to undercover troops, and it appears logical that confrontation could be carried out using regular troops designated as irregulars.
- c. The large proportion of Chinese is significant. The Chinese could be used to cause disturbances which would be made to look like it was internal unrest, as opposed to external aggression.

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Possible Move Forward of Bn HQ 203 BRIMOB Battalion.

51. B3. 16 Jun 66. There has been a large increase of troops (from SELUAS) at the JUNCTION 8746. Previously there were three huts which were occupied, and there are an additional thirteen under construction. The Bn Comd has been with these troops since 1 Jun 66. The buildings are being constructed in an arc around the guns that are in the location. When questioned, the source replied that there were 1000 soldiers, including ARMED in the area.

52. B3. 3 Jul 66 (Same source as paragraph 51 above). Source stated that there were still about 1000 troops at the 'JUNCTION'. The Bn Commander is stationed there. The troops there include BRIMOB, Rangers and ARMED. However source maintained that the Bn HQ was still in SELUAS with a person named SUTOYO in charge.

53. Comment. The number of soldiers reported must be an exaggeration, a closer figure would probably be 200. From the report of the Colonel living there, the increase in numbers, and the guns, it is considered likely that the Bn HQ may have moved forward from SELUAS, probably leaving an administrative element still at SELUAS under SUTOYO.

Deployment of 514 Battalion

54. C3. 8 Jun 66. Source claims there are now approximately 230 troops in BOEMBONG, and approximately 36 troops at SOEBUDJIT. Source states the troops are BRAWIDJAJA. There were still approximately 40 troops whom source described as SRIWIDJAYA in BOEMBONG.

55. Comment. Although this information is now fairly old, it is interesting to note that 514 Bn appeared to be carrying out its main deployment in late May/early June. The mention of SRIWIDJAYA could be a corruption of ZENI TETUR BRAWIDJAJA (Combat Engineers).

Artillery

56. B3. Sub source claims the gun locations as at 16 Jun 66 were three at SELUAS (including one moved approximately one mile EAST of SELUAS), three at JUNCTION 8745, and two just EAST of RISAU. The guns at JUNCTION were described as being about 15 feet overall length, and with four wheels, two wheels being small acting as guide wheels.

57. B2. On 13 Jun 66, the gun at RISAU fired approximately 8 rounds between 0759 hours and 0811 hours. Impact area 9851 (SOUTH of STASS).

58. F3. A gun situated at RISAU fired 20 plus rounds on 13 Jun 66. 6 rounds were fired back from SARAWAK, all of which fell within 100 yards of the gun, causing the gunners to flee. The following day the gun was moved to a new position which is estimated to be on the LEFT hand side of the track RISAU-BABANG, near BABANG. A sub source states the gun is now positioned on his farm, but as it is not near any of his buildings, he is not adverse to SF arty removing it from his land.

59. Comment. Sound ranging Det 'fixed' the gun at 909459. Six rounds were fired at this location and silenced the enemy gun.

PGRS

60. F6. 30 Jun 66. Source saw 7 PGRS moving around the BESAAR at SELUAS. Some were armed, some were not. They were all in uniform with the letters PGRS over their LEFT pocket.

61. F6. BABANG Source has heard from a kampong discussion that the INDONESIAN Government wanted to push the Chinese back to SARAWAK. He has heard the people of BABANG hate the Chinese, and do not want them.

62. F6. Source stated that on the 11 Jun 66, 25 Chinese crossed the border into SARAWAK in the SUNONG RAYA area. None of these has yet returned, as far as source knows. They were all ex-SARAWAK Chinese, wore jungle green uniform and were armed with CARANDS and SMGs.

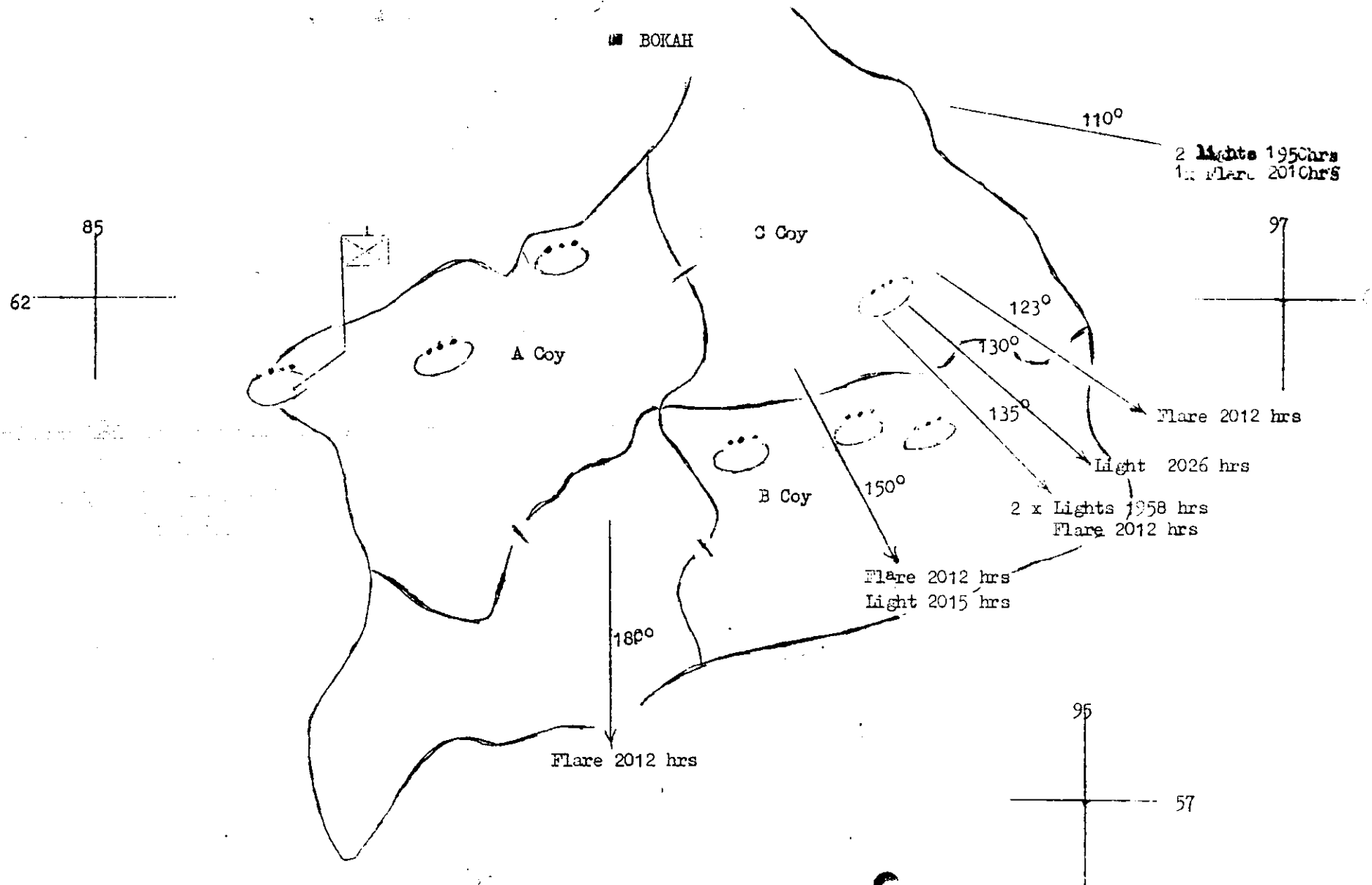
63. Comment. As yet, there has been no confirmation that this party has been infiltrated. It is considered likely that this report is a corruption of the reports of either a MANJAR team or the Chinese party which is believed to have entered SARAWAK on 15 Jun 66 and returned to INDONESIA on 18 Jun 66.

Summary.

64. The following deductions are made:

- a. Further incursions are possible at any time.
- b. MANJAR II has been eliminated as a fighting force.
- c. It is probable MANJAR I is in INDONESIA.
- d. There is NO apparent withdrawal of troops from the border area.
