

THE TWO FACES OF A WARRIOR

Lance Corporal Jason Marks was killed in action in Afghanistan on 27 April 2008.

Jason joined the Army in 1999 and served as a Gunner with 4th Field Regiment RAA. He then served two years with the RAAMC as a medical orderly before joining 4RAR (Cdo) in 2005.

Jason's 4RAR (Cdo) patrol was attacked by Taliban forces in a heavy exchange of small arms fire and rocket propelled grenades. Four other soldiers were also wounded. Jason was accompanied home by two of his mates and a service attended by his wife and family, was conducted at Holsworthy on 06 May.



Jason's funeral was conducted at Yeppoon on 08 May 2008. Members of 4RAR (Cdo) provided the military honours befitting an Australian warrior hero and many former 4RAR members were in attendance at both ceremonies.

ANZAC Day. In the days prior to ANZAC Day, I visited three schools. Mitchelton High School included in their service a commemoration for two of their old boys who were KIA in Vietnam. One of those old boys was Victor Neils Petersen who was KIA with B Coy 4RAR on 16 Feb 1969.

Noel Kelly and I then attended a service at Algester State School during which we presented a Certificate of Associate Membership to Nicola Kelly who has been marching with the association for the past ten years representing the children of those KIA.



At the end of the service more than 200 children lined up to personally thank both us for our service to Australia. We both had tears in our eyes after this honour from the children of Australia.

I then attended the Helensvale State School ceremony and presented two books to the school; Operation Tanager, which was donated by Colonel Jim Underwood that detailed the Battalion's service in East Timor and Duty First, the history of the RAR. The children assured me that they would continue to write letters to those of 4RAR (Cdo) serving overseas and I thanked them on behalf of the Battalion. As I was leaving the school all the students of Class 7D presented me with individual letters of thanks. Another great honour.

ANZAC Day in Brisbane saw about 100 members plus descendents and family members marching. Two members marching had never marched before and nor had they attended a service since their return from South Vietnam. Welcome home fellows. We were also graced with the presence of four Kiwis who travelled across the ditch to march with us. Well done.

LCpl Jason Marks. Noel Kelly, Gary Hansen, Alan Harcourt, Bob Dunn, Max Brown and Alan Price attended the funeral service for LCpl Jason Marks at Yeppoon on 08 May. As Jason was honoured with full military honours in a superb and fitting ceremony it was remarked upon that the 4RAR (Cdo) warriors could successfully adapt to any situation. The service could not be faulted and the outstanding drill, dress and bearing of all those members of the Battalion that took part was a fitting tribute to one their own. I offered the condolences of all members and families of the 4RAR Association Old and those of Vic, Tas, NT and overseas to Mrs Cassandra Marks and to the parents of Jason.

In speaking to members of the Battalion during the wake, appreciation was extended to the 4RAR Association Qld for the letters from the children of Helensvale State School, the ANZAC biscuits and Christmas cakes sent by Mrs Trish Hansen and also the issues of the Fighting Fourth sent to those on operational service by the combined 4RAR state associations. The response from the soldiers makes the hard work done by your committee on your behalf, very much worthwhile.

Helensvale State School. Year 6 and 7 students of Helensvale State School are continuing to send letters to our soldiers overseas. Reports from Mrs Mary Anne White, our school liaison officer, is that some of the letters are very emotive in their support for our soldiers. A letter from a parent praising the project has been presented to the Minister for Education, Qld and is shown on page 11. Well done children and thank you.

The Nui Le Dinner is to be held on Saturday 27 September at Gaythorne RSL Club. Details are on page 14.

In November 1948 the three Infantry Battalions, the 65th, 66th and 67th were redesignated as the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Battalions of the Australian Regiment. Soon after, the Regiment was granted the title Royal and became the Royal Australian Regiment. As the Royal Australian Regiment, it is the regular and primary Infantry regiment of the Australian Army. In November 2008, the Royal Australian Regiment celebrates its 60th year of service. The 23rd of November is not just a birthday or an anniversary of the Regiment but an important milestone of 60 years of continuous service to the nation, many of those years on active service. For the first time ever, RAR warriors who have served from Japan to Afghanistan and within Australia from 1948 to 2008, will be in the same place at the same time, as **THE REGIMENT**.

The RAR Dinner.

The first of the Commemoration events will be the RAR Dinner on the evening of Friday 21 November which has been confirmed as at no charge. Yes, free but attendance is understandably restricted to RAR members and wives or partners. The venue is the Bayside Grand Hall of the Sydney Convention and Exhibition Centre at Darling Harbour. This is a late notice due to the planning required prior to confirmation by the planning committee.

Dress for the dinner is requested as suit/jacket and tie with miniature medals. Timings have not been advised yet but work on 1830 for 1900 hours. The venue has been booked for 1,550 attendees so it is very important that returns for the dinner and the other activities be submitted to Alan Price no later than 16 August. Names then have to be forwarded to the planning committee no later than 18 August. I am sorry for the inconvenience but those who have already submitted additional names of those other than wife or partner for the dinner are requested to submit an amended list to Alan who is acting as the 4RAR Associations' Secretary for the occasion while Garry Heskett is acting as the 4RAR Associations' Co-ordinator.

4RAR ASSOC, QLD BUSINESS NOMINATION

The 4RAR Assoc, Qld was nominated in the Quest Newspapers Queensland Business Achiever Awards for 2008.

The awards recognise reward business excellence in the local community and are a much coveted achievement. SPECIAL FORCES SOLDIERS HONOURED

Two bases in Afghanistan have been named in honour of Australian soldiers. **Patrol Base Worsley** is named after Private Luke Worsley, 4RAR(Cdo), who died during an assault on a Taliban-held compound in November 2007. Patrol Base Worsley was built by Australian combat engineers of the Reconstruction Task Force, near the Baluchi Valley in Oruzgan Province.

Forward Operating Base Locke honours Sergeant Matthew Locke, SASR, who was killed in action in 2006. The base is situated in the Chora Valley, where Sergeant Locke fought Taliban forces in 2006, for which he was awarded the Medal for Gallantry.

Following each naming ceremony, command of the bases was transferred to the Afghan National Army. Operating from Patrol Base Worsley and Forward Operating Base Locke, Afghan troops will provide security to the surrounding areas in partnership with coalition force mentoring teams.

QUEENS HONOURS LIST - JUNE 2008 Distinguished Service Cross (DSC), Major Ian Douglas Langford

For distinguished command and leadership in action as Officer Commanding Alpha Commando Company Group in the Special Operations Task Group, Operation Slipper, Afghanistan.

In an interview with the Army Newspaper Major Langford said that the award of the Distinguished Service Cross recognised the effort of the entire Alpha Commando Company Group that served in Afghanistan from April to September 2007.

Major Langford led his company on 18 clearance operations with 49 direct engagements with the enemy. "I will always remember the courage of my fellow soldiers; whether it be moving from cover to cover to protect our wounded, or assaulting objectives, their actions were outstanding," he said. "The officers and soldiers with whom I served alongside are the most inspiring and dedicated men that I have met in my time in the Army. They performed bravely and contributed significantly to the removal of the enemy capabilities."

Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM), Warrant Officer Class One Kenneth Charles Morris

For meritorious service as the Regimental Sergeant Major of 4th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment (Commando) and the Special Forces Training Centre.

It is believed that at least two further members of 4RAR (Cdo) have received gallantry awards for their efforts in Afghanistan but operational security cannot allow their names to be released.

US Bronze Star, Captain Lachlan Fryer

Captain Fryer, the son of former 4RAR member, Bluey Fryer was awarded the US Bronze Star for service whilst posted to Joint Task Force Headquarters, Operation Citadel, Iraq.

CURLEY'S DIARY

The Diary of 43266 Pte Ian (Curley) Henshall 6 Section, 11 Platoon, D Coy, 4RAR

We left Curley and 11 Platoon astride the Malavsian and Indonesian border about to mount their first top secret "Claret" Operation by conducting a platoon sized reconnaissance patrol into the Indonesian province of Kalimantan in Borneo.

This might be a good time to study the "Golden Rules" for Claret Operations under which the 11 Platoon patrol covertly entered Indonesia. Ed.

"Every operation is to be authorised by the Director of Borneo Operations. (Major General Walker)

Only trained and tested troops are to be used.

Depth of penetration must be limited and attacks must only be made to thwart offensive action by the enemy. No operation which requires close air support - except in an extreme emergency - must be undertaken.

Every operation must be planned with the aid of a sand table and thoroughly rehearsed for at least two weeks.

Each operation to be planned and executed with maximum security. Every man taking part must be sworn to secrecy, full cover-plans must be made and the operations given code-names and never discussed in detail on telephone or radio. Identity discs must be left behind before departure and no traces-such as cartridge cases, paper, ration packs, etc-must be left in Kali-

On no account must any soldier taking part be captured by the enemy-alive or dead."

Sunday 15 May 1966

We set off at a brisk pace along the narrow track on top of the Gunong Raya (the Great Range) to the observation post (OP) at "1672". I was carrying the Bren and by the time we reached the top my bum was hanging around my knees.

From there we went east a thousand yards or so until we found the right track leading down to the Indonesian side of the border into Kalimantan. Incidentally the name of the track was nesian Camp, some one thousand called "The Death Track" and is aptly yards away. Everything went quite named. After making sure it was the right track and after a rest and a brew we started down. I must admit everyone was on the pill and we took things slowly.

After 2 and a half hours of moving along the track we hootchied up (put up tents) and settled in to night routine.

The jungle gets very dark and one our objective, in actual fact Kev can't even see his hand in front of his Freer walked right into it; did he face. At first I was a bit jittery but back pedal!! After a short reconnaisafter a while I relaxed and listened to sance by Cookie (Sgt Denny Cook) the night. One has to experience the and a couple of the blokes, our secciate it. When I listen I am sure the joint. whole jungle is on the move. The frogs and crickets add their voice to the general noises of the night, not to months. Of course we went in caremention the different winged insects, the mossies, gnats and fireflies that never cease to fascinate me. The fireflies actually light up the ground when they are close to it. It's funny but in the daylight the movement of the jungle is not so pronounced. But what gets me is, we hardly see any sign of animal life. After a couple of hours I was relieved and I spent the rest of the night trying to balance my bum on a gigantic tree root.

It was no joke trying to sleep near the gun, everybody either walked over me or sat on me. Tomorrow night will be different.

Monday 16 May 966

After a rough night we rose before first light, packed our gear and after the normal toiletries; a muffled cough, a scratch, followed by a cigarette (well covered up), set off downhill to "Separin", the suspected Indo-

ond pair of hands it was then. Digby (Digby Hammond) the long legged bugger, went down to his groin and would have kept on going only for him straddling a root.

By the time we got through the last of the swamp I was totally buggered and I was getting really angry with the gun.

From there we intended to move to I did the first piquet on my own. within a couple of hundred yards of sounds of the jungle at night to appretion went in to have a look at the

> It was deserted, and it looked as if it had been for at least twelve fully.

> We checked the area for mines and booby traps. We did it very tactically with the machine guns covering all the time. After we checked it over we did a systematic search.



We found a fair bit of rubbish that we brought back for Intelligence. Of course a few of us went bower birding. Bob Rowley picked up an Indonesian Army spoon. Kev Freer picked up a few food wrappers and of course John Chislett had to go

Full hog and bring back a dirty old Indonesian Army sock. Trust him.



After we completed our task we headed back. It took us 5 hours to get there and one hour and forty five minutes to get back. On the way back we again went through the swamps and as usual I fell in the holes again. I wasn't the only one this time. Chis (John Chislett) went down to his bum and we nearly lost the boss's batman, Bluey Gibson. Cookie (Sgt Denny Cook) pulled Blue out after he had gone down to his chest. Poor old Blue, when he goes, he goes all the way. (Blue was later awarded a Distinguished Conduct Medal for bravery with 4RAR in South Vietnam in 1968-69. Ed).

We returned to our old platoon position and hootchied up. It rained very hard on the way back but it wasn't cold. It's not bad walking in the rain. The only trouble was the gun got wet and would rust.

That night I slept with Slug (Johnny Cock) and Digby Hammond. I don't know how we did it but three of us slept in the same tent. I found out that Slug has a big bum. He had half the tent and Digby and I the other. I woke up sleeping outside.

Tuesday 17 May 1966

We spent all of Tuesday based up and Bob "Nose" Powell's' section went to reconnoitre the river. The information that they came back with totally opposed the SAS briefing we received back at Bokah.

We also spent that night there and carried out the usual night routine.

Wednesday 18 May 1966

After a leisurely reveille and a brew we packed up, then it was switch on and bum into gear and back to the border.

It was up hill all the way but we made it in just over 2 hours. I was buggered but I was determined to reach the top. The last 20 yards was the hardest.

Of course the barrel of the gun fell off in the last final effort. The locking catch must have caught in my webbing.

At the top we had a rest then headed to the OP at "1672". From there we went down to "1673" where we hootchied up.

We had made it back unscathed on our first operation into Indonesia. This was a remarkable feat of navigation on the part of the boss and the corporals because the map that we had had nothing but grid lines on it. Navigation was done by compass bearings and the counting of paces and we were spot on the whole time.

The rest of the day was spent lazing around on the border cleaning weapons. Before we shaved we had our photo taken while we were still bearded and scruffy.

That night I had another attack of the runs. Of course I once again filled my pants. I didn't sleep too well that night, perhaps it was the anti climax to the patrol.

Thursday 19 May 1966

This morning we had a late move, as the choppers weren't due in to pick us up until 0900.

Of course the usual happened and they didn't arrive on time, only arriving at 1200. We were left sitting on our backsides for 3 hours before we left the border. Back at Bokah it was straight into test firing weapons and cleaning gear. The company got together to give our boss (2Lt Roger Wickham) a farewell speech as he is leaving in a few days.

Woody (Cpl John Woodley) returned to the platoon today so we are only missing one now due to sickness.

Friday 20 May 1966

The time now is 0745 and fears are held for callsign 41B (2 Section 10 Platoon), they have not come up on the radio since last night.

There has been spasmodic firing heard over the border. It sounds like machine guns and mortars. I hope that 41B are all right. At the moment all we can do is wait. All our operations have been over the border so far, but because of the peace talks we can't hit the Indonesians. 99.9% of all contacts have been on the other side. Sometimes I wonder who is the aggressor. Even the Victoria Cross was won on the Indonesian side. All patrols and contacts over the border have their grid references changed so as to appear as if the locations are on our side of the border.

1700hrs; still no word from 41B and they have been overdue for 30 hours now.

All this morning we worked on fixing up the bunkers and the surrounding area and in the afternoon we played sport to keep us fit. No doubt about it, one has to be fit to climb these "Yamas" (hills).

I had a letter from Mum today and an enclosed one from Veneta. Nothing much from Mum except that my brother was home recently on pre-embarkation leave before leaving for Vietnam.

The letter from Veneta has dashed all hopes of a future meeting. She has found a boy friend and is getting engaged soon, or she should be by now. I must admit I was most upset. Well if that's what she wants I wish her all the best and I am envious of her new fiancé.

It has just come to hand that 41B has rejoined 41 (10 Platoon) so every thing is OK. I bet the old man (Lt Col David Thomson MC) is relieved. Our Platoon Commander leaves tomorrow so the company had a parade to present him with a beer can gong. All of us are sorry to see him go. He was a good "wheel" and we all came to know him pretty well in the 2 years that he had with the Platoon.

Saturday 21 May 1966

Well today has been a lazy one. In actual fact we didn't do much at all. We started PT again and it was rather gut busting getting back into the swing of things. We had another airdrop this morning; a total of 5 1ton chutes.

The boss left this morning to begin his new job as Assistant Adjutant. Before he left he was busy taking photos of various members of the platoon. He caught me in the mess having breakfast.

During the afternoon while the rain held off, we started to rebuild the volleyball court. It was an enjoyable afternoon the "nogs" (the villagers) enjoyed working with us. Of course we joked with them and they learnt a few Aussie swear words.

When the rain started we packed it in and went back to our holes (bunkers). Everybody had the bright idea of making ashtrays out of 105 mm artillery cartridges. So far there has been some real good ones with various designs. Slug (John Cock) made a beauty, with a cut out map of Borneo. It looks quite effective and he gave it to Pricey (Alan Price).

Tonight was the movie night and was quite good. All the locals from Kampong Bokah came; women and kids mainly. It was just like old times when I used to go to the Salisbury "bug house"; same atmosphere. I think that the locals are getting to like us better. The Ghurkhas and the Poms never did as much for them or treated to write a poem. It goes like this: them as we do.

I felt a little foolish as last night while on piquet, I wrote to Lorraine asking her to write. At the time I didn't think of it but I must look a bit of a nut in her eyes. Even so it's too late to do anything now as the letter was posted. No doubt nothing will come of it. Maybe I just wrote for the sake of writing because I don't receive much mail and because I had a kick in the bum from one that I did receive.

Last night we were told that Danny Patch had died from a disease contracted here. I don't know if he died in Singapore or not. I didn't know him personally, I can't really place him. Some of the boys knew him and it, was sad news for them to hear.

Danny's death is the first in Borneo. I wonder if there will be another. They say things happen in threes.

Sunday 22 May 1966

Once again today for the main part, was an easy one and we were mainly left to our own devices.

Instead of the usual PT we worked up a sweat completing the volleyball court. After breakfast we went out to fire the 2 inch mortar and the M26 grenade off the rifle. At first I was a little nervous as I haven't used them before, and I always seem to be that way. We fired the 2 inch smoke, paraflare and HE. After a few bombs I was all right but I am still dubious about the M26. We had four blinds out of 12 grenades.

During the afternoon we worked on the volleyball court for a little while then it was back to the "private" projects. Everyone seems to be making ashtrays or dog tags. John Bryce has nearly finished making a dummy for the hangman's noose above their door. It's a real beaut. He calls it "uho". It even has pips on its shoulders. Below the noose reads a sign, "DON'T GET CAUGHT HANGING AROUND HERE".

The last stretch is the hardest so they

But I am buggered if I know, it's been hard all day.

Thank God the gates are in sight.

Well the evening has turned out to be a happy one for John Chislett. His wife June gave birth to baby boy this morning, so we are all having a drink with him. Mousie Davidson and Steve Erceg were put on the dry today. Mousie was rotten drunk on rum. I don't think the CO appreciated him singing happy birthday to himself over the battalion net.

AREN"T OUR CHILDREN BEAUTIFUL

On Tuesday 03 June 2008 Mr Alan Price and Mr Noel Kelly of the 4th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment Association (4RAR) of Oueensland at the invitation of the Principal, Mr Robert Pascoe, addressed the Grade Six and Seven students of Helensvale State School on the Gold Coast. Alan had addressed the school on ANZAC Day and I was very much impressed with his style of presentation and his ability to speak to the children at their level of comprehension. This time however, Alan and Noel were following up on Project Commando which was instigated by the Association two years ago and which involves the children of the school writing to members of 4RAR (Commando) serving overseas.

Alan explained, "It all started when I was attending a BBQ at my daughter's place in Helensvale and I mentioned to my daughter that I was intending to start a project and ask school children to write to our soldiers overseas. I mentioned the fact of how pleased I was to receive letters and drawings from her and her sister when I was overseas and away from family so many years ago.

A teacher from the Helensvale State School was at the BBQ and she stated quite strongly that if I was to commence the project, then Helensvale State School wanted to be a part of it. That spurred me on and I gained approval from my committee, contacted the Principal, Mr Robert Pascoe and the Commanding Officer of 4RAR (Commando) and they all consented. Mrs Mary-Anne White, a Grade 7 teacher accepted the role of School Liaison Officer and there was no turning back."

I believe many letters have been sent back and forth over the last two years but the reaction by the students last Tuesday when Alan and Noel asked them to continue the project was overwhelming especially after they were told how excited the soldiers were to receive the letters.

Alan went on to say that when he and Noel walked into Mrs White's classroom to share morning tea with the students, he saw on the white-board a list of spelling words; many of the words had a military flavour but which were used in everyday speech. That impressed him and gave him a starting point with the children.

Alan and Noel then addressed two groups of approximately 180 students. The address included a history of 4RAR, its beginnings and its war service. He then explained that wars were started by bullies who attempted to take other countries property and to stand over their people. It was explained to the children that Australia had never started a war, had never lost a war but had always defeated the bullies who attempted to take over the countries of our friends. He then explained that after a war, Australia had always stayed to help the country devastated by war to rebuild. He explained that our former enemies were now our friends.

I had never given much thought to the basics of war but in the light of what Alan said, I can now recognise and applaud the efforts of our soldiers. Alan explained that some of the soldiers would have children of their own attending school back home in Australia; that some would have babies that that they had never seen and that some might not even have a family and that a letter from a Helensvale State School student would show how much the children of Australia respected them and appreciated the work that they do. He then explained some of the tasks expected of a 4RAR (Cdo) and explained that as much of their work was secret, they received no public recognition or thanks.

He went on to explain that the people who hate war the most are soldiers but that to defend their homes, their communities and their country and more importantly their children, was the reason that Australian soldiers go to war.

He then asked the students if they would write a letter to the 4RAR (Commando) soldiers serving overseas. Some of the students asked if they could send some small gifts to the soldiers. Alan suggested that they could perhaps send a handkerchief as that would be a gift that would be appreciated by the soldiers.

Alan then did something that mystified me. He discussed with the children, the ways that a soldier could use a handkerchief and I giggled to myself and thought of the obvious answer: to wipe his nose and one suggestion from the children was exactly that. Other uses were then suggested by the children; to blow his nose, to treat a wound, to wipe sweat from his eyes; to clean his rifle, as a good luck charm, to wipe the dust from his eyes, to wrap his money in, to wear as a hat, to wash his boots, to wash his face, to brush his teeth and when he was sad, to wipe away his tears.

These were obviously the answers that Alan was waiting for. Alan convinced the students that when the soldier would first read their letters and then find the

handkerchief that the first use of the handkerchief would be to wipe away the tears gratitude from receiving a letter from a child in Helensvale State School.



The immediate response from the children was to ask how they should send a letter and what they could put it in it. Alan suggested that as the letters to soldiers were personal letters from each of them that they could talk about anything in those letters. They could talk about their school life, their achievements, their pets, their school and family and perhaps enclose a photo.

Alan then asked them to start writing straight away but said that it may take some time before they received a reply due to the work of the soldiers. Many children asked if they could write to more than one soldier. Many questions were then asked about the conditions of soldiers in the field, how the soldiers might react on receiving a letter and many other things.

Alan and Noel did a great job in explaining war and the work of 4RAR (Cdo) warriors in the field and when I left, I had a tear in my eye and needed one of those hand-kerchiefs. I also noticed that Alan and Noel, both veterans of two wars, had a tear in their eyes as Noel remarked to me, "Aren't our children beautiful!"


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
